Yet, the river is not without its threats. Every monsoon, villages are uprooted as the river swells with power. Climate change has intensified this cycle, with glacial melt and erratic rainfall increasing its ferocity. Entire ecosystems along the riverbank are now under stress and livelihoods increasingly face uncertainty.

Despite its fury, the Brahmaputra remains a symbol of resilience and renewal. Its waters carry not just silt and stories, but also the identity of the communities along its banks. To understand this river is to understand a landscape shaped as much by nature's might as by human adaptation, endurance and unwavering faith.
